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LIBRARIES WELCOME NEW DIGITAL HUMANITIES LIBRARIAN

he Rutgers University Libraries are pleased to welcome Francesca Giannetti, the

new digital humanities librarian on the New Brunswick campuses.

Francesca will work with Rutgers faculty, administrators, and students to coordinate campuswide engagement with the digital humanities. She will serve as a resource on digital scholarship and collaborate with campus stakeholders to integrate digital resources, methodologies and tools in the humanities disciplines. Francesca will provide consultation services and training on a variety of topics, including computational methods and scholarly communication. She will assist in developing and implementing strategies for digital curation and work with subject specialists to ensure that research materials unique to the Libraries are discoverable, usable, and preserved. Francesca will also serve as the subject liaison to the students and faculty of the French, Italian, and Comparative Literature departments. In this capacity she will provide instruction and research consultations, and develop the print and digital collections that support teaching and research in those disciplines.

Prior to joining Rutgers, Francesca was the acting Music Librarian in the Fine Arts Library at the University of Texas at Austin. Previous to that she was a graduate

research assistant in the Fine Arts Library, working with the Historical Music Recording Collection, a teaching assistant for the School of Information, and a technology services intern in the Harry Ransom Humanities Research Center. Her background in digital humanities and digital libraries includes the creation and curation of digital collections of manuscripts belonging to the Ransom Center and the Dolph Briscoe Center for American History. Francesca received her MS in Information Studies from the School of Information at the University of Texas, a vocal performance degree from the École Normale de Musique de Paris, and a BA in Art History and French from Case Western Reserve University.

Francesca's publications include reviews of works of scholarship dealing with the book trade in 17th century Italy (http://tinyurl.com/ot8pqqz) and courtly love songs in 17th century France (http://tinyurl.com/otf6bmh). She also wrote a digital media review of SoundCloud (https://soundcloud.com/) that appeared in the most recent edition of *Notes*, the journal of the Music Library Association (http://tinyurl.com/nfneu4f).

program. In addition, Lily will serve as a liaison to students, faculty, and staff of the Department of Communication in the School of Communication and Information, providing instruction, consultations, and collection development.

Prior to joining the Rutgers University Libraries, Lily was a reference and instruction librarian at the University of South Florida (USF), where she also taught undergraduate research methods courses as an

Fulbright Scholar Victor
Zverevich, formerly the head of
the Department of Research and
Development at the Moscow City
Library Center, arrived in November
2013 and began his research in
the Alexander Library. Libraries
Administration welcomed him
warmly, providing him with an office
and an open invitation to meet with
staff across the system.

Victor's research project focuses on "Virtual Space and the US Academic and Public Libraries: Structure, Operation, Services." It looks at the way libraries arrange their "virtual" spaces (websites and/or pages in social media), the services libraries provide to their users in "virtual" mode (from websites and/or pages in social media) and the

accessibility of those services. He chose to study the Rutgers University Libraries because, in many ways, it represents a close to ideal type of virtually connected library system.

A cohesive central library administration enables individual library facilities on Rutgers campuses across the state to fluidly share human resources and library materials. The Rutgers library system also works with a broad range of regional and national library consortia, encompassing academic and public libraries, allowing the system to provide a robust range of services that no one library could

possibly offer on its own.

"Rutgers librarians and library staff members, who I've met with, have all been very generous with their time and in sharing their expertise," Victor stated recently. "They have helped me understand library services that are new to me, such as designing video clips for instructional purposes, digitizing papers for electronic reserves, handling document delivery

> and inter-library loan services in electronic mode only, and other options. I am grateful for all I've learned, and all the talented people I've met, in the Rutgers University Libraries."

The Rutgers University Libraries look forward to seeing the results of Victor's research project

when he concludes his work in April. We wish him much success in getting to that point.

LIBRARIES WELCOME NEW ARCHIVIST AT THE INSTITUTE OF JAZZ STUDIES

he Rutgers University Libraries are pleased to welcome Elizabeth Surles, the new archivist in the Institute of Jazz Studies (IJS).

Elizabeth will oversee the archival collections at IJS, including preserving, processing, and making accessible the many personal papers, business records, photographs,

musical recordings, memorabilia, ephemera, and other artifacts housed at IJS. One high priority project will be to improve access to the materials at IJS through the creation of online finding aids for the collections. Elizabeth is currently working on a box-level survey of all IJS archival collections, to create an updated

master-list of holdings and assist in identifying priority preservation projects.

Prior to joining IJS, Elizabeth served as library director and digitization archivist at the American Alpine Club Library in Golden, Colorado. Previously she worked as project coordinator for the Starr-Gennett Foundation in Richmond, Indiana, which is dedicated to preserving the history of the pioneering jazz record label, Gennett Records, and its parent organization, the Starr Piano Company. Elizabeth received an MLIS degree, with a Certificate in Special Collections, and

a Masters in Musicology degree from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. She received a Bachelor of Arts degree cum laude in both Music and History from Lawrence University in Appleton, Wisconsin.

Elizabeth was recently accepted into the Institute for Research Design in Librarianship, a nine day summer residency program at Loyola

Marymount University in Los Angeles, California. Through a competitive selection process, this program brings together a diverse group of 21 librarians to receive training and support to help them design and complete a significant research project. The program is funded by the Institute of Museum and

Library Services, a federal government program. Elizabeth's research will compare the contents of finding aids for music collections at different archives.
